
Birkat Kohanim: The Priestly Blessing

Birkat HaKohanim, also known as the Priestly Benediction or "duchening", is a Jewish rite wherein the Kohanim (members of the priestly caste) recite a blessing. While the congregation closes or averts their eyes, the Kohanim stand on the bimah, cover their faces with their prayer shawls (tallitot), and recite the blessing while stretching their arms up and forming their hands into a three pronged shape like the letter "shin" [Leonard Nimoy, who grew up not far from here, borrowed that hand gesture to accompany the Vulcan greeting 'live long and prosper' on Star Trek]. Because of the stance of the Kohanim during the blessing, Birkat HaKohanim is also called Nesiat Kapayim ("raising of the hands").

In the diaspora the priestly blessing is typically recited by the Kohanim on Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Pesach, Shavuot, and Sukkot. The text itself is considered so central to the service that it is recited during the repetition of the Amidah on weekdays and Shabbat. The prayer also survived intact into many Christian services.

The question of whether women-b'not Kohen and b'not Levi-may participate in Birkat HaKohanim in the egalitarian minyan is currently under discussion at TBS. In the coming months the ritual committee plans


Yad Chesed Purim Appeal

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

Gentle readers, as this issue reaches your mailbox sunset is nearing the trough in its sinusoidal yearly journey (Shabbat candlelighting is 3:54 pm on December 4th) and will begin its slow climb back up. The shortest day of the year, marking the beginning of winter, is approaching, and cold weather is setting in in earnest. Our festival of lights, commemorating the victory of the Macabees over Antiochus, the rededication of the temple, and the miracle of the oil lamp is on the horizon.

As you reflect on the fire of the sun far away, the fire of the menorah long ago, and the fire of the Hanukah candles near at hand, please take a moment in the here and now to donate to keep the (boiler) fires burning at the shul. The steam boiler that heats the sanctuary has sprung a leak, and although we've lovingly maintained this equipment long past its predicted life we must now replace it or face a winter of cold Shabbat davening. The systems that heat the vestry, shul office and Gimmel room are still functioning.

Arnold Reinhold and the building committee are currently evaluating quotes to replace the defunct boiler. Options under consideration include replacing the boiler with another steam boiler; replacing it (and the radiators in the sanctuary) with a hot water system, or installing a heating and cooling system on the roof. Whichever option is selected, it will (a) be more energy efficient than our old system... and (b) require a significant capital outlay. The heating plus air conditioning option would cost more to install, so if you want the sanctuary to have air conditioning please consider donating for that purpose. *See p. 7 for a donation form!* As the end of the tax year approaches, please contribute what you can.
