Plot Summary

Considered by many to be the gem of the Gilbert & Sullivan canon, *The Mikado* is an irresistible concoction of rapturous melody, witty satire, and exotic locale, peopled with unforgettable characters. There's Ko-Ko, the newly appointed Lord High Executioner, baffled by the logistics of having to execute himself before he can dispatch the other names on his "little list." Pooh-Bah, with his inflated ego, distinguished ancestry and readily crossed palm, is Lord High Everything Else. Nanki-Poo, the handsome son of the Mikado, is on the lam disguised as a questionably proficient second trombonist, pursuing his secret passion for the aptly named Yum-Yum. She, a model of Japanese schoolgirl perfection, has mastered the art of flirting—if only flirting were not a crime punishable by death. Katisha, breathtakingly ugly (save her famous left shoulder-blade), is a formidable noblewoman who has set her sights on Nanki-Poo. When the Mikado arrives on the scene, it's up to him to sort out the romantic entanglements and assign punishments to fit the crimes.

The Blue Hill Troupe brings high-quality theater performances to New York City audiences while raising money for New York City charities. The Troupe was founded in 1924 by four families summering in Maine. Its inaugural production, *H.M.S. Pinafore*, took place on board the founders' yacht in Blue Hill, Maine. Since then, the Troupe has evolved into a widely-recognized urban theater company with 450 active and 250 associate members. In its 89 years, the Troupe has produced every Gilbert & Sullivan operetta multiple times, plus 28 musicals, while donating about \$4 million to charity. Hailing from all walks of life and spanning several generations, Troupers donate their time and energy to produce two full theatrical productions a year: a Broadway musical or light opera each fall and a Gilbert and Sullivan operetta each spring. The Blue Hill Troupe has been featured on CBS Sunday Morning and with The New York Pops at Carnegie Hall.

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The Norfolk Historical Society, Inc., is a non-profit organization established in 1960 with a mission to procure, preserve, and exhibit artifacts relating to the history of the town of Norfolk, CT. The Society maintains its collections and mounts exhibitions in its Museum, housed in the 1840 Norfolk Academy building in the town's Historic District on the Village Green. The Norfolk Historical Museum is open to the public on weekends from May to October and by appointment. Admission is free. On display this summer is the exhibition Village Hall to Infinity Hall: 130 Years of Culture, Commerce & Community, celebrating the remarkable history of the building now known as Infinity Hall. Built in 1883, Village Hall was a community cultural center with stores and shops on the first floor and a concert hall on the second, modeled after New York's recentlyconstructed Metropolitan Opera House. The theater was dedicated with a performance of Gilbert & Sullivan's H.M.S. Pinafore on July 30, 1884. Today's performance returns Gilbert & Sullivan to the Village Hall stage for the first time since that dedication.
